Recognizing June 20, 2015 as “World Refugee Day”.

IN THE SENATE OF THE UNITED STATES

Mr. CARDIN (for himself, Mr. RUBIO, and Mr. LEAHY) submitted the following resolution; which was referred to the Committee on

RESOLUTION

Recognizing June 20, 2015 as “World Refugee Day”.

Whereas World Refugee Day is a global day to honor the courage, strength, and determination of women, men, and children who are forced to flee their homes under the threats of conflict, violence, and persecution;

Whereas there are nearly 60,000,000 displaced people worldwide, the highest levels ever recorded, including almost 20,000,000 refugees, 38,000,000 internally displaced people, 10,000,000 stateless people, and 1,800,000 people seeking asylum;

Whereas according to the Office of the United Nations High Commissioner for Refugees (referred to in this preamble as “UNHCR”), nearly 4,000,000 refugees have fled Syria since the start of the Syrian conflict and more than 7,600,000 people are internally displaced;

Whereas more than 1,000,000 people are displaced within Ukraine with approximately 800,000 Ukrainians seeking protection in other countries as a result of a worsening humanitarian situation in nongovernment controlled areas;

Whereas since April 2015, sporadic outbursts of violence in Burundi have prompted 90,000 Burundians to flee to the neighboring countries of Rwanda, Tanzania, Uganda, and the Democratic Republic of the Congo;

Whereas violent insurgent attacks in Nigeria have forced 192,000 people to flee to the neighboring countries of Cameroon, Chad, and Niger, and have internally displaced 1,200,000 people;

Whereas more than 88,000 women, men, and children, including many persecuted Rohingya refugees from Burma, have departed on smugglers' boats from the Bay of Bengal since 2014, more than 1,000 of whom have died at sea;

Whereas as of June 2015, more than 62,000 refugees and migrants have crossed the Mediterranean Sea from North Africa and at least 1,800 women, men, and children have died during such crossings;

Whereas there are countless new conflicts forcing people to flee and protracted displacement situations, including—

- (1) 117,000 Iraqi refugees;
- (2) more than 3,000,000 internally displaced Iraqis;
- (3) more than 680,000 South Sudanese refugees in neighboring countries; and
- (4) more than 465,000 refugees from the Central African Republic;

Whereas the United States provides critical resources and support to the UNHCR and other international and non-governmental organizations working with refugees around the world; and

Whereas between 1985 and 2015, the United States welcomed more than 3,000,000 refugees who are resettled in communities across the country: Now, therefore, be it

1 *Resolved*, That the Senate—

2 (1) reaffirms the bipartisan commitment of the
3 United States to promote the safety, health, and
4 well-being of the millions of refugees who flee war,
5 persecution, and torture in search of peace, hope,
6 and freedom;

7 (2) calls upon the United States Government—

8 (A) to continue its international leadership
9 role in response to those who have been dis-
10 placed, including the most vulnerable popu-
11 lations who endure sexual violence, human traf-
12 ficking, forced conscription, genocide, and ex-
13 ploitation; and

14 (B) to find political solutions to existing
15 conflicts and prevent new conflicts from begin-
16 ning;

17 (3) commends those who have risked their lives
18 working individually and for the countless non-
19 governmental organizations and international agen-
20 cies such as UNHCR that have provided life-saving

1 assistance and helped protect those displaced by con-
2 flict around the world; and

3 (4) reiterates the strong bipartisan commitment
4 to protect and assist millions of refugees and other
5 forcibly uprooted persons worldwide.
