3 SECTION 1. SHORT TITLES.

4 This Act may be cited as the "Making Iran Sanctions

5 Stick In Lieu of Expiration of Sanctions Act" or the

6 "MISSILES Act".

7 SEC. 2. FINDINGS.

8 Congress makes the following findings:

9 (1) Annex B to United Nations Security Coun-

10 cil Resolution 2231 (2015) restricts certain missile-

11 related activities and transfers to and from Iran, in-

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cluding all items, materials, equipment, goods, and
 technology set out in the Missile Technology Control
 Regime Annex, absent advance, case-by-case approval from the United Nations Security Council.

5 (2) Iran has transferred Shahed and Mohajer 6 drones, covered under the Missile Technology Con-7 trol Regime Annex, to the Russian Federation, the 8 Government of Ethiopia, and other Iran-aligned en-9 tities, including the Houthis in Yemen and militia 10 units in Iraq, without prior authorization from the 11 United Nations Security Council, in violation of the 12 restrictions set forth in Annex B to United Nations 13 Security Council Resolution 2231.

14 (3) Absent action by the United Nations Secu15 rity Council, certain missile-related restrictions in
16 Annex B to United Nations Security Council Resolu17 tion 2231 will expire in October 2023, removing
18 international legal restrictions on missile-related ac19 tivities and transfers to and from Iran.

20 SEC. 3. STATEMENT OF POLICY.

21 It is the policy of the United States—

(1) to combat and deter the transfer of conventional and non-conventional arms, equipment, material, and technology to or from Iran, or involving the
Government of Iran;

1 (2) to ensure countries, individuals, and entities 2 engaged in, or attempting to engage in, the acquisi-3 tion, facilitation, or development of arms and related 4 components and technology and subject to restric-5 tions under Annex B to United Nations Security 6 Council Resolution 2231 are held to account under 7 United States and international law, including 8 through the application and enforcement of sanc-9 tions and use of export controls, regardless of wheth-10 er the restrictions under Annex B to United Nations 11 Security Council Resolution 2231 remain in effect 12 following their anticipated expiration in October 13 2023;14 (3) to urgently seek the extension of missile-re-15 lated restrictions set forth in Annex B to United Na-16 tions Security Council Resolution 2231 (2015); and 17 (4) to use all available authorities to constrain 18 Iran's domestic ballistic missile production capabili-19 ties. 20 **SEC. 4. DEFINITIONS.** 21 In this Act: 22 (1) APPROPRIATE CONGRESSIONAL COMMIT-TEES.—The term "appropriate congressional com-23 mittees" means-24

1	(A) the Committee on Foreign Relations of
2	the Senate;
3	(B) the Committee on Banking, Housing,
4	and Urban Affairs of the Senate;
5	(C) the Committee on Foreign Affairs of
6	the House of Representatives; and
7	(D) the Committee on the Judiciary of the
8	House of Representatives.
9	(2) COVERED TECHNOLOGY.—The term "cov-
10	ered technology" means—
11	(A) any goods, technology, software, or re-
12	lated material specified in the Missile Tech-
13	nology Control Regime Annex, as in effect on
14	the day before the date of the enactment of this
15	Act; and
16	(B) any additional goods, technology, soft-
17	ware, or related material added to the Missile
18	Technology Control Regime Annex after the
19	day before the date of the enactment of this
20	Act.
21	(3) FOREIGN PERSON.—The term "foreign per-
22	son"—
23	(A) means an individual or entity that is
24	not a United States person; and

(B) includes a foreign state (as such term
is defined in section 1603 of title 28, United
States Code).
(4) GOOD.—The term "good" means any arti-
cle, natural or manmade substance, material, supply
or manufactured product, including inspection and
test equipment, and excluding technical data.
(5) GOVERNMENT OF IRAN.—The term "Gov-
ernment of Iran" has the meaning given such term
in section 560.304 of title 31, Code of Federal Reg-
ulations, as such section was in effect on January 1,
2021.
(6) IRAN-ALIGNED ENTITY.—The term "Iran-
aligned entity" means a foreign person that—
(A) is controlled by or reports directly to
the Government of Iran; and
(B) knowingly receives material or finan-
cial support from the Government of Iran, in-
cluding Hezbollah, Ansar Allah, or another Ira-
nian-backed proxy group.
(7) KNOWINGLY.—The term "knowingly" has
the meaning given such term in section $14(13)$ of
the Iron Constiant Act of 1006 (50 USC 1701
the Iran Sanctions Act of 1996 (50 U.S.C. 1701

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1	(8) Missile technology control regime.—
2	The term "Missile Technology Control Regime"
3	means the policy statement between the United
4	States, the United Kingdom, the Federal Republic of
5	Germany, France, Italy, Canada, and Japan that
6	was announced on April 16, 1987, to restrict sen-
7	sitive missile-relevant transfers based on the Missile
8	Technology Control Regime Annex, and any amend-
9	ments thereto or expansions thereof, as in effect on
10	the day before the date of the enactment of this Act.
11	(9) Missile technology control regime
12	ANNEX.—The term "Missile Technology Control Re-
13	gime Annex" means the Guidelines and Equipment
14	and Technology Annex of the Missile Technology
15	Control Regime, and any amendments thereto or up-
16	dates thereof, as in effect on the day before the date
17	of the enactment of this Act.
18	(10) UNITED STATES PERSON.—The terms
19	"United States person" means—
20	(A) a United States citizen;
21	(B) a permanent resident alien of the
22	United States;
23	(C) an entity organized under the laws of
24	the United States or of any jurisdiction within

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1	the United States, including a foreign branch of
2	such an entity; or
3	(D) a person in the United States.
4	SEC. 5. DEPARTMENT OF STATE REPORT ON DIPLOMATIC
5	STRATEGY AND OTHER ASPECTS OF UNITED
6	NATIONS SECURITY COUNCIL RESOLUTION
7	2231 EXPIRATIONS.
8	Not later than 90 days after the date of the enact-
9	ment of this Act, and annually thereafter for the following
10	4 years, the Secretary of State, in coordination with the
11	heads of other relevant departments and agencies, shall
12	submit to the appropriate congressional committees an un-
13	classified report, with a classified annex, if necessary, that
14	includes—
15	(1) a diplomatic strategy to secure the renewal

tions and other multilateral organizations, including
the European Union, to hold accountable foreign
persons that have violated the restrictions set forth
in Annex B to United Nations Security Council Resolution 2231, and efforts to prevent further violations of such restrictions;

(7) a description of actions by individual mem ber states of the United Nations Security Council to
 hold accountable foreign persons that have violated
 restrictions set forth in Annex B to United Nations
 Security Council Resolution 2231 and efforts to pre vent further violations of such restrictions;

7 (8) a description of actions taken by the Peo-8 ple's Republic of China, the Russian Federation, or 9 any other country to prevent, interfere with, or un-10 dermine efforts to hold accountable foreign persons 11 that have violated the restrictions set forth in Annex 12 B to United Nations Security Council Resolution 13 2231, including actions to restrict United Nations-14 led investigations into suspected violations of such 15 restrictions, or limit funding to relevant United Na-16 tions offices or experts;

(9) an analysis of the foreign and domestic supply chains in Iran that directly or indirectly facilitate, support, or otherwise aid the Government of
Iran's drone or missile program, including storage,
transportation, or flight-testing of related goods,
technology, or components;

(10) the identification of any foreign entity or
entities that enables, supports, or otherwise facilitates the operations or maintenance of any Iranian

airline subject to United States sanctions or export
 control restrictions;

3 (11) an assessment of how the continued oper4 ation of Iranian airlines subject to United States
5 sanctions or export control restrictions impacts the
6 Government of Iran's ability to transport or develop
7 arms, including covered technology; and

8 (12) a description of actions taken by the Peo-9 ple's Republic of China, the Russian Federation, or 10 any other country that have violated the restrictions 11 set forth in Annex B of United Nations Security 12 Council Resolution 2231, including any purchase, 13 transfer, or acquisition of covered technology or 14 component parts.

15 SEC. 6. COMBATING THE PROLIFERATION OF IRANIAN MIS16 SILES.

(a) IN GENERAL.—The actions, including sanctions,
described in subsection (b) shall apply to any foreign person the President determines, on or after the date of the
enactment of this Act—

(1) knowingly engages in any effort to acquire,
possess, develop, transport, transfer, or deploy covered technology to, from, or involving the Government of Iran or Iran-aligned entities, regardless of
whether the restrictions set forth in Annex B to

United Nations Security Council Resolution 2231
 (2015) remain in effect after October 2023;
 (2) knowingly provides entities owned or con-

3 (2) knowingly provides entities owned or con4 trolled by the Government of Iran or Iran-aligned
5 entities with goods, technology, parts, or compo6 nents, that may contribute to the development of
7 covered technology;

8 (3) knowingly participates in joint missile or 9 drone development, including development of covered 10 technology, with the Government of Iran or Iran-11 aligned entities, including technical training, storage, 12 and transport;

(4) knowingly imports, exports, or re-exports to,
into, or from Iran, whether directly or indirectly,
any significant arms or related materiel prohibited
under paragraph (5) or (6) to Annex B of United
Nations Security Council Resolution 2231 (2015) as
of April 1, 2023; or

(5) knowingly provides significant financial, material, or technological support to, or knowingly engages in a significant transaction with, a foreign
person subject to sanctions for conduct described in
paragraph (1), (2), (3), or (4).

24 (b) SANCTIONS DESCRIBED.—The sanctions de-25 scribed in this subsection are the following:

1	(1) BLOCKING OF PROPERTY.—The President
2	shall exercise all authorities granted under the Inter-
3	national Emergency Economic Powers Act (50
4	U.S.C. 1701 et seq.) to the extent necessary to block
5	and prohibit all transactions in property and inter-
6	ests in property of the foreign person if such prop-
7	erty and interests in property are in the United
8	States, come within the United States, or come with-
9	in the possession or control of a United States per-
10	son.
11	(2) INELIGIBILITY FOR VISAS, ADMISSION, OR
12	PAROLE.—
13	(A) VISAS, ADMISSION, OR PAROLE.—An
14	alien described in subsection (a) shall be—
15	(i) inadmissible to the United States;
16	(ii) ineligible to receive a visa or other
17	documentation to enter the United States;
18	and
19	(iii) otherwise ineligible to be admitted
20	or paroled into the United States or to re-
21	ceive any other benefit under the Immigra-
22	tion and Nationality Act (8 U.S.C. 1101 et
23	seq.).
24	(B) CURRENT VISAS REVOKED.—

1	(i) IN GENERAL.—The visa or other
2	entry documentation of any alien described
3	in subsection (a) is subject to revocation
4	regardless of the issue date of the visa or
5	other entry documentation.
6	(ii) Immediate effect.—A revoca-
7	tion under clause (i) shall, in accordance
8	with section 221(i) of the Immigration and
9	Nationality Act (8 U.S.C. 1201(i))—
10	(I) take effect immediately; and
11	(II) cancel any other valid visa or
12	entry documentation that is in the
13	possession of the alien.
14	(c) PENALTIES.—Any person that violates, or at-
15	tempts to violate, subsection (a) or any regulation, license,
16	or order issued pursuant to that subsection, shall be sub-
17	ject to the penalties set forth in subsections (b) and (c)
18	of section 206 of the International Economic Powers Act
19	(50 U.S.C. 1705) to the same extent as a person that com-
20	mits an unlawful act described in subsection (a) of that
21	section.

(d) WAIVER.—The President may waive the application of sanctions under this section with respect to a foreign person for renewable periods not to exceed 180 days
only if, not later than 15 days before the date on which

the waiver is to take effect, the President submits to the
 appropriate congressional committees a written deter mination and justification that the waiver is in the vital
 national security interests of the United States.

(e) IMPLEMENTATION.—The President may exercise
all the authorities provided under sections 203 and 205
of the International Emergency Economic Powers Act (50
U.S.C. 1702 and 1704) to carry out the amendments
made by this section.

10 (f) RULEMAKING.—

(1) IN GENERAL.—Not later than 120 days
after the date of the enactment of this Act, the
President, in consultation with the Secretary of
State, shall promulgate any regulations that are necessary to implement this Act and the amendments
made by this Act.

17 (2) NOTIFICATION TO CONGRESS.—Not less
18 than 10 days before the promulgation of regulations
19 pursuant to paragraph (1), the President shall sub20 mit to the appropriate congressional committees—

21 (A) a copy of the proposed regulations;22 and

(B) a description of the specific provisions
of this Act and the amendments made by this
Act that such regulations are implementing.

1 (g) EXCEPTIONS.—

(1) EXCEPTION FOR INTELLIGENCE ACTIVITIES.—Sanctions authorized under this section shall
not apply to any activity subject to the reporting requirements under title V of the National Security
Act of 1947 (50 U.S.C. 3091 et seq.) or any authorized intelligence activities of the United States.

8 (2) EXCEPTION TO COMPLY WITH INTER-9 NATIONAL OBLIGATIONS AND FOR LAW ENFORCE-10 MENT ACTIVITIES.—Sanctions authorized under this 11 section shall not apply with respect to an alien if ad-12 mitting or paroling the alien into the United States 13 is necessary—

14 (A) to permit the United States to comply
15 with the Agreement regarding the Head16 quarters of the United Nations, signed at Lake
17 Success June 26, 1947, and entered into force
18 November 21, 1947, between the United Na19 tions and the United States, or other applicable
20 international obligations; or

21 (B) to carry out or assist authorized law
22 enforcement activity in the United States.

23 (3) EXCEPTION RELATING TO IMPORTATION OF
24 GOODS.—The authorities and requirements to im25 pose sanctions authorized under this section shall

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1	not include the authority or a requirement to impose
2	sanctions on the importation of goods.
3	(h) TERMINATION OF SANCTIONS.—This section
4	shall cease to be effective beginning on the date that is
5	30 days after the date on which the President certifies
6	to the appropriate congressional committees that—
7	(1) the Government of Iran no longer provides
8	support for international terrorism, as determined
9	by the Secretary of State pursuant to—
10	(A) section $1754(c)(1)(A)$ of the Export
11	Control Reform Act of 2018 (50 U.S.C.
12	4318(c)(1)(A));
13	(B) section 620A of the Foreign Assistance
14	Act of 1961 (22 U.S.C. 2371);
15	(C) section 40 of the Arms Export Control
16	Act (22 U.S.C. 2780); or
17	(D) any other provision of law; and
18	(2) Iran has ceased the pursuit, acquisition,
19	and development of, and verifiably dismantled, its
20	nuclear, biological, and chemical weapons and bal-
21	listic missiles and ballistic missile launch technology.

17 1 SEC. 7. REPORT TO IDENTIFY, AND DESIGNATION AS FOR-2 EIGN TERRORIST ORGANIZATIONS OF, IRA-3 NIAN PERSONS THAT HAVE ATTACKED 4 UNITED STATES CITIZENS USING UNMANNED 5 COMBAT AERIAL VEHICLES. 6 (a) IN GENERAL.—Not later than 90 days after the 7 date of the enactment of this Act, and every 180 days 8 thereafter, the Secretary of State shall submit to the ap-9 propriate congressional committees a report that identifies, for the period specified in subsection (b), any Iranian 10 person that has attacked a United States citizen using an 11 12 unmanned combat aerial vehicle, as defined for the pur-13 pose of the United Nations Register of Conventional 14 Arms. 15 (b) PERIOD SPECIFIED.—The period specified in this subsection is— 16 17 (1) for the initial report, the period— 18 (A) beginning on October 27, 2023; and 19 (B) ending on the date such report is sub-

20 mitted; and

21 (2) for the second or a subsequent report, the22 period—

23 (A) beginning on the date the preceding24 report was submitted; and

25 (B) ending on the date such second or sub-26 sequent report is submitted.

(c) DESIGNATION OF PERSONS AS FOREIGN TER 2 RORIST ORGANIZATIONS.—

3 (1) IN GENERAL.—The President shall des4 ignate any person identified in a report submitted
5 under subsection (a) as a foreign terrorist organiza6 tion under section 219 of the Immigration and Nat7 uralization Act (8 U.S.C. 1189).

8 (2) REVOCATION.—The President may not re-9 voke a designation made under paragraph (1) until 10 the date that is 4 years after the date of such des-11 ignation.

12 (d) WAIVER.—The Secretary of State may waive the 13 requirements of this section upon a determination and cer-14 tification to the appropriate congressional committees that 15 such a waiver is in the vital national security interests of 16 the United States.

17 (e) SUNSET.—This section shall terminate on the18 date that is 4 years after the date of the enactment of19 this Act.

20 (f) IRANIAN PERSON DEFINED.—In this section, the
21 term "Iranian person"—

(1) means an entity organized under the laws
of Iran or otherwise subject to the jurisdiction of the
Government of Iran; and

(2) includes the Islamic Revolutionary Guard
 Corps.
