

**Opening Statement for
Rebekah Goshorn Jurata
Nominated To Be U.S. Executive Director of the International Monetary Fund**

Chairman Risch, Ranking Member Shaheen, and distinguished Members of the Committee, thank you for the opportunity to appear before you today as President Trump's nominee to serve as the United States Executive Director at the International Monetary Fund.

I want to thank President Trump and Secretary Bessent for their support; I am humbled by this nomination. Most of my career has been spent in public service, and that is where my heart has always been. I look forward, if confirmed, to returning to public service in this capacity.

I would like to briefly acknowledge some of the people I am most grateful to and have helped pave the way for me to appear before you today: my family and friends.

I want to recognize my father, who is no longer with us, but whose life was a powerful example of the American dream. Born during the Great Depression, my dad began working at age 6, enlisted in the United States Navy and ultimately became a computer engineer. From him, I learned love of country and the belief that hard work and determination can make anything possible. From my mother, I learned that good judgment requires not only intellect, but also heart.

I also want to acknowledge my stepdaughters, Kaitlyn and Jacki, my brother Joshua, his wife Molly, and my three nephews. Thank you all for your encouragement. Lastly, and not least, I want to thank my husband, Jay, whose love and support have made my service possible.

Those lessons, and the love of a large and supportive group of family and friends, have shaped both who I am and how I have approached my career.

My professional experience has centered on financial markets, economic policy, and public service. I have had the privilege of serving at the Department of the Treasury, the White House National Economic Council, the Securities and Exchange Commission, the House Financial Services Committee, and the Public Company Accounting Oversight Board. While at Treasury, I was honored to represent the United States in international standard-setting bodies, where I saw firsthand the importance of American engagement in multilateral institutions in promoting pro-growth economic policies and market-oriented regulatory frameworks.

That experience taught me that American leadership in these forums is not optional — when we step back, others fill the vacuum, often in ways that do not reflect our interests or values. Throughout my career, one lesson has remained constant: American prosperity is inseparable from economic growth, stability, transparency, and confidence in the financial system, both here at home and in the international institutions that help sustain it.

The IMF was founded to, among other responsibilities, promote international monetary cooperation, facilitate the balanced growth of international trade, promote exchange rate stability, and provide members with resources, under appropriate safeguards, to correct balance-of-payment problems without resorting to measures destructive to national or international prosperity. If confirmed, it will be a priority of mine to help ensure the IMF is focused on this core mission.

As U.S. Executive Director, I will work to ensure the United States' voice is clear and effective at the IMF in advancing our economic and strategic interests, consistent with the President's America First policy. I believe the objective of facilitating balanced growth of fair and reciprocal trade should be a focus of the Fund's work, and I will push for policies that strengthen economic growth and stability both here and among our trading partners. At the same time, I believe the IMF must maintain rigorous conditions and accountability in its lending programs and remain focused on its core financial stability mission, rather than expanding into areas beyond its mandate.

I will work closely with the Treasury Department and the Administration to advance American interests at the IMF, and I will engage with this Committee throughout my service. I am grateful for the opportunity to continue a career in public service that I care deeply about, and I hope to earn your support.
