3	SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.
4	This Act may be cited as the "Foreign Aid Trans-
5	parency and Accountability Act of 2012".
6	SEC. 2. GUIDELINES FOR UNITED STATES FOREIGN ASSIST-
7	ANCE PROGRAMS.
8	(a) Purpose.—The purpose of this section is to
9	evaluate the performance of United States foreign assist-
10	ance and its contribution to policy, strategies, projects,

- 1 program goals, and priorities undertaken by the Federal
- 2 Government, to foster and promote innovative programs
- 3 to improve effectiveness, and to coordinate the monitoring
- 4 and evaluation processes of Federal departments and
- 5 agencies that administer foreign assistance.
- 6 (b) Establishment of Guidelines.—Not later
- 7 than one year after the date of the enactment of this Act,
- 8 the President shall establish guidelines regarding the es-
- 9 tablishment of measurable goals, performance metrics,
- 10 and monitoring and evaluation plans that can be applied
- 11 on a uniform basis to United States foreign assistance.
- 12 Such guidelines shall be established according to best
- 13 practices of monitoring and evaluation studies and anal-
- 14 yses.
- (c) Objectives of Guidelines.—
- 16 (1) In General.—The guidelines established
- under subsection (b) shall provide direction to Fed-
- eral departments and agencies that administer
- 19 United States foreign assistance on how to develop
- the complete range of activities relating to the moni-
- 21 toring of resources, the evaluation of projects, the
- evaluation of program impacts, and analysis that is
- 23 necessary for the identification of findings, gen-
- eralizations that can be derived from those findings,

1	and their applicability to proposed project and pro-
2	gram design.
3	(2) Objectives.—Specifically, the guidelines
4	shall provide direction on how to achieve the fol-
5	lowing objectives for monitoring and evaluation pro-
6	grams:
7	(A) Building measurable goals, perform-
8	ance metrics and monitoring and evaluation
9	into program design at the outset, including the
10	provision of sufficient program resources to
11	conduct monitoring and evaluation.
12	(B) Disseminating guidelines for the devel-
13	opment and implementation of monitoring and
14	evaluation programs to all personnel, especially
15	in the field, who are responsible for the design,
16	implementation and management of foreign as-
17	sistance programs.
18	(C) Developing a clearinghouse capacity
19	for the dissemination of knowledge and lessons
20	learned to United States development profes-
21	sionals, implementing partners, the inter-
22	national aid community, and aid recipient gov-
23	ernments, and as a repository of knowledge on
24	lessons learned.

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1	(D) Distributing evaluation reports inter-
2	nally and making this material available online
3	to the public. Furthermore, providing a sum-
4	mary including a description of methods, key
5	findings and recommendations to the public on-
6	line in a fully searchable form within 90 days
7	after the completion of the evaluation. Prin-
8	cipled exceptions will be made in cases of classi-
9	fied or proprietary material.
10	(E) Establishing annual monitoring and
11	evaluation agendas and objectives that are re-
12	sponsive to policy and programmatic priorities.
13	(F) Applying rigorous monitoring and eval-
14	uation methodologies, choosing from among a
15	wide variety of qualitative and quantitative
16	methods common in the field of social scientific
17	inquiry.
18	(G) Partnering with the academic commu-
19	nity, implementing partners, and national and
20	international institutions that have expertise in
21	monitoring and evaluation and analysis when
22	such partnerships will provide needed expertise
23	or will significantly improve the evaluation and
24	analysis.

1	(H) Developing and implementing a train-
2	ing plan for aid personnel on the proper con-
3	duct of monitoring and evaluation programs.
4	(d) Implementation of Guidelines.—Beginning
5	not later than one year after the date on which the Presi-
6	dent establishes the guidelines under subsection (b), the
7	head of each Federal department or agency that admin-
8	isters United States foreign assistance shall administer
9	the foreign assistance in accordance with the guidelines.
10	(e) Report.—Not later than one year after the date
11	of the enactment of this Act, the President shall submit
12	to Congress a report that contains a detailed description
13	of the guidelines that have been developed on measurable
14	goals, performance metrics, and monitoring and evalua-
15	tion plans for United States foreign assistance programs
16	established under this section.
17	(f) EVALUATION DEFINED.—In this section, the term
18	"evaluation" means, with respect to a United States for-
19	eign assistance program, the systematic collection and
20	analysis of information about the characteristics and out-
21	comes of the program and projects under the program as
22	a basis for judgments, to improve effectiveness, and to in-
23	form decisions about current and future programming.

1	SEC. 3. INTERNET WEB SITE TO MAKE PUBLICLY AVAIL-
2	ABLE COMPREHENSIVE, TIMELY, COM-
3	PARABLE, AND ACCESSIBLE INFORMATION
4	ON UNITED STATES FOREIGN ASSISTANCE
5	PROGRAMS.
6	(a) Establishment; Publication and Up-
7	DATES.—Not later than 30 days after the date of the en-
8	actment of this Act, the President shall direct the Sec-
9	retary of State to establish and maintain an Internet
10	website to make publicly available comprehensive, timely,
11	comparable, and accessible information on United States
12	foreign assistance programs. The head of each Federal de-
13	partment or agency that administers United States for-
14	eign assistance shall, not later than three years after the
15	date of the enactment of this Act, publish and on a quar-
16	terly basis update on an Internet website such information
17	with respect to the programs of the department or agency.
18	(b) Matters To Be Included.—
19	(1) In general.—Such information shall be
20	published on a detailed program-by-program basis
21	and country-by-country basis.
22	(2) Types of information.—To ensure trans-
23	parency, accountability, and effectiveness of United
24	States foreign assistance programs, the information
25	shall include country assistance strategies, annual
26	budget documents, congressional budget justifica-

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tions, obligations, expenditures, and reports and evaluations for United States foreign assistance programs and projects under such programs. Each type of information described in this paragraph shall be published or updated on the Internet website not later than 90 days after the date of issuance of the information.

(3) Report in Lieu of inclusion.—If the head of a Federal department or agency makes a determination that the inclusion of a required item of information on the Internet website would jeopardize the health or security of an implementing partner or program beneficiary or would be detrimental to the national interests of the United States, the head of the Federal department or agency may provide briefings to Congress on the item of information or submit to Congress the item of information in a written report in lieu of including it on the Internet website, along with the reasons for not including it in the database required under this section.

(c) Scope of Information.—

(1) IN GENERAL.—The Internet website shall contain the information described in subsection (b) as follows:

1	(A) For fiscal year 2013, the information
2	relating to such fiscal year and each of the im-
3	mediately preceding 2 fiscal years.
4	(B) For fiscal year 2014, the information
5	relating to such fiscal year and each of the im-
6	mediately preceding 3 fiscal years.
7	(C) For fiscal year 2015, the information
8	relating to such fiscal year and each of the im-
9	mediately preceding 4 fiscal years.
10	(D) For fiscal year 2016, the information
11	relating to such fiscal year and each of the im-
12	mediately preceding 5 fiscal years.
13	(2) Older information.—For fiscal year
14	2017 and each fiscal year thereafter, the Internet
15	website shall also contain a link to a searchable
16	database available to the public containing informa-
17	tion described in subsection (b) relating to fiscal
18	years prior to the immediately preceding 5 fiscal
19	years but subsequent to fiscal year 2010.
20	(d) FORM.—The information required under sub-
21	section (b) shall be published on the Internet website in
22	unclassified form. Any information determined to be clas-
23	sified or particularly sensitive information may be sub-
24	mitted to Congress in classified form. An unclassified
25	summary of such information shall be published on the

- 1 Internet website unless the head of the Federal depart-
- 2 ment or agency, in consultation with the appropriate con-
- 3 gressional committees, determines that such publication
- 4 would have a detrimental effect on national security.

5 SEC. 4. OFFSET.

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- 6 Notwithstanding any other provision of law, the Sec-
- 7 retary of State and the head of each other Federal depart-
- 8 ment or agency that administers United States foreign as-
- 9 sistance, in consultation with the appropriate congres-
- 10 sional committees, shall—
- 11 (1) eliminate such initiatives, positions, and 12 programs within the Department of State or such 13 other department or agency that are not otherwise 14 required by law as the Secretary or the head of such 15 other department or agency determines to be nec-16 essary to entirely offset any and all costs incurred 17 to carry out the provisions of this Act with respect 18 to the Department of State or such other depart-19 ment or agency;
 - (2) ensure no net increases in personnel are added to carry out the provisions of this Act, with any new full or part time employees ore equivalents offset by eliminating an equivalent number of existing staff; and

1	(3) report to Congress not later than 90 days
2	after the date of the enactment of this Act the ac-
3	tions taken to ensure compliance with paragraphs
4	(1) and (2), including the specific initiatives, posi-
5	tions, and programs within the Department of State
6	or such other department or agency that have been
7	eliminated to ensure that the costs of carrying out
8	this Act will be offset.
9	SEC. 5. DEFINITIONS.
10	In this Act:
11	(1) Appropriate congressional commit-
12	TEES.—The term "appropriate congressional com-
13	mittees" means—
14	(A) the Committee on Foreign Relations
15	and the Committee on Appropriations of the
16	Senate; and
17	(B) the Committee on Foreign Affairs and
18	the Committee on Appropriations of the House
19	of Representatives.
20	(2) United states foreign assistance.—
21	The term "United States foreign assistance" has the
22	meaning given the term "foreign assistance" in sec-
23	tion 634(b) of the Foreign Assistance Act of 1961
24	(22 U.S.C. 2394 (b)).
