A BILL

To require a quadrennial diplomacy and development review, and for other purposes.

- 1 Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-
- 2 tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,
- 3 SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.
- 4 This Act may be cited as the "Quadrennial Diplo-
- 5 macy and Development Review Act of 2012".

1	SEC. 2. QUADRENNIAL DIPLOMACY AND DEVELOPMENT
2	REVIEW.
3	(a) Requirement.—
4	(1) Quadrennial reviews required.—
5	Under the direction of the President, the Secretary
6	of State shall every four years, during a year fol-
7	lowing a year evenly divisible by four, conduct a re-
8	view of United States diplomacy and development
9	(to be known as a "quadrennial diplomacy and de-
10	velopment review").
11	(2) Scope of Reviews.—Each quadrennial di-
12	plomacy and development review shall be a com-
13	prehensive examination of the national diplomacy
14	and development policy and strategic framework of
15	the United States for the next four year period until
16	a subsequent review is due under paragraph (1).
17	The review shall include—
18	(A) recommendations regarding the long-
19	term diplomacy and development policy and
20	strategic framework of the United States;
21	(B) priorities of the United States for di-
22	plomacy and development; and
23	(C) guidance on the related programs, as-
24	sets, capabilities, budget, policies, and authori-
25	ties of the Department of State and United
26	States Agency for International Development.

1	(3) CONSULTATION.—In conducting each quad-
2	rennial diplomacy and development review, after con-
3	sultation with Department of State and United
4	States Agency for International Development offi-
5	cials, the Secretary of State should consult with—
6	(A) the heads of other relevant Federal
7	agencies, including the Secretary of Defense,
8	the Secretary of the Treasury, the Secretary of
9	Homeland Security, the Attorney General, the
10	Secretary of Health and Human Services, the
11	Secretary of Agriculture, the Secretary of Com-
12	merce, the Chief Executive Officer of the Mil-
13	lennium Challenge Corporation, and the Direc-
14	tor of National Intelligence;
15	(B) any other Federal agency that provides
16	foreign assistance, including at a minimum the
17	Export-Import Bank of the United States and
18	the Overseas Private Investment Corporation;
19	(C) the Committee on Foreign Relations
20	and the Committee on Appropriations of the
21	Senate and the Committee on Foreign Affairs
22	and the Committee on Appropriations of the
23	House of Representatives and, as appropriate,
24	other members of Congress; and

1	(D) other relevant governmental and non-
2	governmental entities, including private sector
3	representatives, academics, and other policy ex
4	perts.
5	(b) Contents of Review.—Each quadrennial diplo
6	macy and development review shall—
7	(1) delineate, as appropriate, the national diplo
8	macy and development policy and strategic frame
9	work of the United States, consistent with appro
10	priate national, Department of State, and United
11	States Agency for International Development strate
12	gies, strategic plans, and relevant presidential direc
13	tives, including the national security strategy pre
14	scribed pursuant to section 108 of the National Se
15	curity Act of 1947 (50 U.S.C. 404a);
16	(2) outline and prioritize the full range of crit
17	ical national diplomacy and development areas, capa
18	bilities, and resources, including those implemented
19	across agencies, and address the full range of chal
20	lenges confronting the United States in this regard
21	(3) describe the interagency cooperation, and
22	preparedness of relevant Federal assets, and the in
23	frastructure, budget plan, and other elements of the
24	diplomacy and development policies and programs of
25	the United States required to execute successfully

1 the full range of mission priorities outlined under 2 paragraph (2); 3 (4) describe the roles of international organiza-4 tions and multilateral institutions in advancing 5 United States diplomatic and development objec-6 tives, including the mechanisms for coordinating and 7 harmonizing development policies and programs with 8 partner countries and among donors; 9 (5) identify the budget plan required to provide 10 sufficient resources to successfully execute the full 11 range of mission priorities outlined under paragraph (2);12 13 (6) include an assessment of the organizational 14 alignment of the Department of State and the 15 United States Agency for International Development 16 with the national diplomacy and development policy 17 and strategic framework referred to in paragraph 18 (1) and the diplomacy and development mission pri-19 orities outlined under paragraph (2); 20 (7) review and assess the effectiveness of the 21 management mechanisms of the Department of 22 State and the United States Agency for Inter-23 national Development for executing the strategic pri-24 orities outlined in the quadrennial diplomacy and de-

velopment review, including the extent to which such

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1	effectiveness has been enhanced since the previous
2	report; and
3	(8) the relationship between the requirements of
4	the quadrennial diplomacy and development review
5	and the acquisition strategy and expenditure plan
6	within the Department of State and the United
7	States Agency for International Development.
8	(e) Reporting.—
9	(1) IN GENERAL.—Not later than the year fol-
10	lowing the year in which a quadrennial diplomacy
11	and development review is conducted, but not later
12	than the date on which the President submits the
13	budget for the next fiscal year to Congress under
14	section 1105(a) of title 31, United States Code, the
15	Secretary of State shall submit to Congress a report
16	regarding that quadrennial diplomacy and develop-
17	ment review.
18	(2) Contents of Report.—Each report sub-
19	mitted under paragraph (1) shall include—
20	(A) the results of the quadrennial diplo-
21	macy and development review conducted in ac-
22	cordance with, and based on a detailed assess-
23	ment of, the provisions of and considerations
24	set out in subsections (a)(2) and (b), addressing

1	each of the key elements identified in such sub-
2	sections;
3	(B) a description of the threats to the as-
4	sumed or defined national security interests of
5	the United States that were examined for the
6	purposes of that review;
7	(C) an explanation of any underlying as-
8	sumptions used in conducting the review; and
9	(D) any other matters the Secretary of
10	State considers appropriate.
11	(3) Public availability.—The Secretary of
12	State shall, consistent with the protection of national
13	security and other sensitive matters, make each re-
14	port submitted under paragraph (1) publicly avail-
15	able on the Internet Web site of the Department of
16	State.
17	(d) Establishment.—The Secretary of State may
18	establish within the Department of State an Office of
19	Quadrennial Diplomacy and Development Review, which
20	the Secretary of State may, using only existing resources,
21	staff in a manner to assist in discharging the functions
22	under this section.
23	(e) Foreign Affairs Policy Board Review.—
24	The Secretary of State should apprise the Foreign Affairs
25	Policy Board on an ongoing basis of the work undertaken

1 in the conduct of the quadrennial diplomacy and develop-

- 2 ment review and, upon completion of the review, the
- 3 Chairman of the Foreign Affairs Policy Board should, on
- 4 behalf of the Board, prepare and submit to the Secretary
- 5 an assessment of the review for inclusion in the report
- 6 submitted under subsection (c).
