AN ACT

- To require the Secretary of State to take such actions as may be necessary for the United States to rejoin the Bureau of International Expositions, and for other purposes.
 - 1 Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-
 - 2 tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,
 - 3 SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.
 - 4 . This Act may be cited as the "U.S. Wants to Com-
 - 5 pete for a World Expo Act".
 - 6 SEC. 2. FINDINGS.
 - 7 Congress finds the following:

(1) The Bureau of International Expositions 1 (BIE) is the organization responsible for governing 2 World Fairs and International Expositions. 3 (2) Section 1(a) of Public Law 91 269 (22 4 U.S.C. 2801(a)) found that "international expo-5 sitions * * * have a significant impact on the eco-6 nomic growth of the region surrounding the expo-7 sition and * * * are important instruments of ma-8 9 tional policy". (3) The United States has not been an active 10 member of the BIE since 2001. 11 (4) State and local governments and private en-12 tities in the United States have continued to partici-13 pate in international expositions held in foreign 14 countries as a means of promoting United States ex-15 ports and creating jobs, but face significantly higher 16 costs for such participation because the United 17 States is not an active member. 18 (5) State and local governments and private en-19 tities in the United States have expressed interest in 20 an international exposition being hosted in the 21 United States, but the bid of a United States city, 22 region, or State to host an international exposition 23 is unlikely to be successful if the United States is 24 25 not a member of the BIE.
