## A BILL

To support countries in Latin America and the Caribbean that maintain official diplomatic relations with Taiwan, to counter efforts by the People's Republic of China to coerce or pressure governments into breaking such ties, to deepen coordination with Taiwan on diplomatic, development, and economic engagement in the Western Hemisphere, and for other purposes.

- 1 Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled, 3 **SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.** 4 This Act may be cited as the "United States-Taiwan Partnership in the Americas Act". 6 SEC. 2. 18	and often concealed application of media manipula-
19	tion, economic coercion, cyber-intrusions, targeted in-
20	vestments, and academic censorship that is in-
21	tended—
22	(A)(i) to corrupt businesses and political
23	and nongovernmental institutions;
24	(ii) to interfere in democratic elections; and

1	(iii) to encourage self-censorship of views at
2	odds with those of the Government of the People's
3	Republic of China or the Chinese Communist
4	Party;
5	(B) to foster attitudes, behavior, decisions,
6	or outcomes in Taiwan and elsewhere that sup-
7	port the interests of the Government of the Peo-
8	ple's Republic of China or the Chinese Com-
9	munist Party; or
10	(C) to undermine the administrative activi-
11	ties or daily operations of the Taiwan govern-
12	ment.
13	SEC. 8. BRIEFING ON DETERRENCE IN THE TAIWAN STRAIT.
14	Not later than 60 days after the date of the enactment
15	of this Act, the Secretary of State, in coordination with the
16	heads of relevant Federal departments and agencies, shall
17	brief the Committee on Foreign Relations of the Senate and
18	the Committee on Foreign Affairs of the House of Represent-
19	atives by providing—
20	(1) an assessment of the military posture of Tai-
21	wan and the United States as it specifically pertains
22	to the deterrence of military conflict and conflict
23	readiness in the Taiwan Strait; and
24	(2) an analysis of whether current Taiwan and
25	United States policies sufficiently deter the People's
