4 This Act may be cited as the "Ukraine Human5 Rights Policy Act of 2022".

8	tion centers operated by the Russian Federation or
9	Russian Federation-affiliated non-state groups; and
10	(4) other actions of the Government of the Rus-
11	sian Federation that constitute gross violations of
12	human rights related to the invasion of Ukraine by
13	the Russian Federation.
14	(b) Committees Specified.—The committees spec-
15	ified in this subsection are—
16	(1) the Committee on Foreign Relations and
17	the Select Committee on Intelligence of the Senate;
18	and
19	(2) the Committee on Foreign Affairs and the
20	Permanent Select Committee on Intelligence of the
21	House of Representatives.
